


Township of Essa – Total Calls for Service

Essa Monthly Occurrence Totals










Provincial Offences - Essa Township 2021





AMO's Call to End Homelessness

There is a rising homelessness crisis that exists amidst a housing affordability crisis, and it is taking a devastating toll on individuals and communities. The government's significant investment through the Social Services Relief Fund has mitigated some of the worst impacts of COVID-19 on the homeless population. This has literally saved lives during the pandemic. The implementation of by-name lists and enumeration by service managers are also important measures.

Increasing housing affordability is the primary solution; however, there is a range of actions that can be taken by all orders of government to prevent and break the cycle of homelessness. AMO is inviting the provincial government to work together to build on the productive work to date with AMO, municipalities, and District Social Services Administration Boards.

The next step is to come together to co-design and implement a plan of action to end homelessness in Ontario. With time, this is an achievable goal and there is a moral and economic imperative to act now. It is in the interest of all Ontarians. A proposal to the province, with five recommended foundational steps and twenty-three actions, can now be found on AMO's website.

AMO Housing Paper Upcoming Release

AMO is actively engaging with municipal associations and the provincial government on the housing crisis. Our white paper, **Blueprint for Action: An Integrated**

Approach to Address the Ontario Housing Crisis, with recommendations will be available later this week. The paper acknowledges housing challenges in every part of Ontario. The province is anticipating its release, and it is expected that the paper can serve as a platform for integrated problem solving. The paper proposes clear actions for all orders of government and the development industry.

Managing Off-Load Delays

As ambulances face increasing offload times in hospitals, the Ministry of Health has now provided <u>guidance</u> should the expansion of consolidation ("batching") of patients within the hospital be strategically needed to enable paramedic crews to return to service quickly. This practice has been used by various paramedic services across the province and this ministry direction is now providing a more consistent approach to "batching".

Hospitals and paramedic services that are considering further expansion and formalization of the batching of patients may work towards establishing a memorandum of understanding (MOU) between the hospital(s) and paramedic service(s). This MOU is to include the assignment of liability and is to be done with appropriate municipal council/DSSAB approvals where the Single/Upper Tier Municipality/DSSAB employs and delivers paramedic services.

AMO Policy Update - AMO's Integrated Housing Paper with Long-Term Care Phase 1 Regulations and Community Housing Regulations Submissions

"A Blueprint for Action: An Integrated Approach to Address the Ontario Housing Crisis"

AMO is pleased to release <u>"A Blueprint for Action: An Integrated Approach to Address the Ontario Housing Crisis"</u>. The Blueprint takes a principle-based approach and outlines nearly 90 recommendations on how to guide collective action to build a strong housing sector throughout the province.

Ontario is facing a housing affordability and supply crisis. The Blueprint builds on AMO's longstanding positions and advocacy around housing and provides a new starting point for ongoing collaboration and collective work by all orders of government and the development sector to make a meaningful difference in Ontario communities. The Blueprint calls for a new collective mindset and transformative change to address the systemic issues around housing affordability over the long term.

We stand ready to work together with the province, federal government, and development sector to meet the long-term housing affordability needs of all Ontarians.

AMO Submission on *Fixing Long-Term Care Act* Phase 1 Regulations



The *Fixing Long-Term Care Act, 2021* will come into effect in April 2022, along with the first phase of regulations. AMO has <u>submitted comments</u> through the regulatory registry on these Phase 1 regulations.

The proposed regulatory changes are significant and will cause an increased cost and regulatory burden for long-term care homes. AMO is asking the Ministry of Long-Term Care to commit to fully costing and funding the implementation of these regulatory changes and for implementation timelines to reflect the challenges of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

AMO has outlined 8 key principles that have informed the comments on each of the regulatory changes in the submission and looks forward to continuing to work with the Ministry and the sector on improving long-term care.

AMO Response to Proposed Regulatory Amendments for Community Housing

AMO responded with a <u>submission</u> to the regulatory posting concerning Ontario Regulation 367/11 under the *Housing Services Act, 2011* about new requirements for community housing including service agreements, service levels, and access. The proposed changes will have a significant impact for years to come with financial implications.

In our view, the regulations should follow in the spirit of the enabling legislative framework by maximizing local flexibility and not be overly prescriptive with significantly new requirements and rules that would increase administrative burden and additional costs. A new focus on outcomes, consistent with local Housing and Homelessness Plans, should be adopted as much as possible, immediately with future regulatory development.

AMO Policy Update – Fire Certification Regulation Response and Federal Transit Investment

Fire Certification Regulations – AMO's Response

AMO has responded to the draft regulations regarding firefighter certification consultation launched on January 28, 2022. While AMO believes in principle that certification is a step in the right direction, it has not endorsed the draft regulations. AMO believes the thirty-day consultation period was insufficient and did not reflect the broad-based municipal engagement necessary for regulations of this scale and scope. A more thorough engagement with the municipal sector is necessary for the province to fully appreciate the effects such regulations will have on municipal governments and their fire services.

In a <u>letter</u> to Solicitor General Jones dated February 25th, 2022, AMO requested a two-month extension to allow for an appropriate amount of time for Ministry officials to brief municipal leaders and then for municipal councils to be able to thoughtfully reply back on the draft regulations. AMO has also requested: an extension to the implementation period and financial support during that period; better alignment with the Community Risk Assessments that must be completed by 2025; and a review of the provision of fire services to unincorporated areas.

Municipal governments are generally supportive of efforts to modernize and enhance the volunteer and full-time fire services that serve Ontario communities. That said, changes must be made in a consultative and thorough manner which recognizes the role that Ontario municipalities play in the provision of those services.

Federal Transit Shortfall Investment

The Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, the Honourable Chrystia Freeland, <u>announced</u> recently that the federal government intends to introduce legislation to invest up to \$750 million in one-time funding for local transit systems to cover pandemic shortfalls. This funding is in addition to the federal public transit



funding and previous 2020 Safe Restart Agreement (SRA) funding. The Minister noted that the funding would be conditional on provincial matching funding for transit shortfalls and provincial collaboration on improving housing supply. The funding is proposed to flow to provinces allocated through the currently used ridership and population-based formula.

Through the SRA, Ontario and the federal government provided up to \$2B to Ontario municipalities to offset transit revenue losses and new costs. The Ontario government also flowed \$150 million in March 2021 to municipalities to cover additional pandemic-related transit shortfalls. Ontario also recently topped up the Ontario Gas Tax Fund for Transit to make up for declines in fuel taxes as motorists used less fuel during the lockdowns.

It is expected that further information on allocations of this new federal funding will be available when legislation is introduced.

AMO's Response to the Province's Housing Affordability Task Force Report

AMO has provided the province with our <u>response</u> to the Province's Housing Affordability Task Force Report. The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated the urgency of addressing the housing affordability and supply crisis in Ontario. AMO has been actively involved in housing and homelessness work for years, including our <u>Housing Blueprint</u>. We are well-positioned to provide advice on what is necessary to address the housing crisis affecting our communities.

A new collective mindset and transformative change around housing is required, as tinkering around the edges will not be successful. AMO encourages the provincial government to find ways to address the housing crisis in Ontario in a way that requires all three orders of government and private, non-profit, and co-operative housing sectors (collectively referred to as "development sector") to work collectively to improve affordability, diversify the housing mix, and increase supply. AMO urges the provincial government to carefully consider the recommendations put forward in our Blueprint as opposed to relying heavily on the Housing Affordability Task Force Report.

Work is ongoing with AMO's Affordable Housing and Planning Task Forces, and we will continue to work with the province in the coming weeks on this matter.

Ontario Health Team (OHT) Funding Requests to Municipal Governments

Today, AMO President Jamie McGarvey sent a <u>letter</u> to Minister Elliott, Minister of Health, stating that Ontario Health Teams' (OHT) requests for funding to municipalities and their services are inappropriate and unacceptable. It had come to AMO's attention over the last month that several municipal governments, public health units, and municipal services (e.g., paramedic services, long-term care homes) have been asked by OHTs to provide funding for their 2022/23 operating budgets. These requests seem to be linked to having a seat at the OHTs' health care service planning and decision-making table(s) as currently permitted by the Ministry of Health's <u>2020</u> Guidance to the OHTs.

To date, AMO is not aware of any municipality, public health unit, municipal long-term care home, or paramedic service providing such funding to an OHT and would strongly urge members not to contribute to OHT operating funds. Funding of Ontario Health, OHTs, and the health care system is a provincial responsibility.

The AMO President's letter also directly asks the Minister of Health not to flow costshared public health and paramedic services, and the provincial funding for municipal long-term care, through Ontario Health in the future as this funding and the relationship need to remain on a government-to-government basis.

Tiffin Centre for Conservation receives \$1,000 from Retired Teachers of Ontario for mud kitchen

UTOPIA, Ontario (February 17, 2022) – The Tiffin Centre for Conservation will soon have a new mud kitchen for its Tiffin Nature Program. In a cheque presentation today, the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority (NVCA) received \$1,000 from the Retired Teachers of Ontario/Les enseignantes et enseignants retraités de l'Ontario District 17-Simcoe County (RTO/ERO District 17-Simcoe County).

The Tiffin Nature Program is geared towards children between 2.5 and 6. Part of the program encourages open-ended play in nature – using loose parts and freedom of choice to fuel children's curiosity. By focusing on the process, children will build a relationship with nature, develop fine motor skills and learn how to cooperate with others who are also using the space.

"We're very excited to start this project," said Naomi Saunders, Manager of Education at NVCA. "The Tiffin Nature Program started last fall and children were using muffin tins, spatulas, pots and pans. The mud kitchen will provide a permanent creative space that mimics a kitchen, equipped with a sink, stove and counterspace. Add water, dirt, rocks, sticks and imagination and you never know what we will be cooking up!"

The mud kitchen will be built by NVCA's Lands Team, while the funds from RTO/ERO District 17-Simcoe County will be used for purchasing wood and other materials.

"Every year, we set aside approximately \$4,000 for grants that go towards local non-profit groups and organizations that have projects that would benefit children, seniors, or the community," said Glenn Conduit, President of RTO/ERO District 17-Simcoe County. "The mud kitchen for the Tiffin Nature Program is one of ten projects we are supporting this year. The District 17 Executive is very pleased to support the creation of the mud kitchen which will be enjoyed by young students for many years to come."

With a forest cabin as the homebase, the Tiffin Nature Program is located at the Tiffin Centre for Conservation, an ideal spot with over 300 acres of forests, meadows, wetlands and ponds to explore. Registration is now open for sessions in April, May and June. <u>Please visit NVCA's website</u> to register or for more information about the program.

Presentation on Natural Heritage

Ryan Post, Manager of Watershed Science and Dave Featherstone, Senior Ecologist gave a presentation on NVCA's Natural Heritage Program.

This program is part of NVCA's strategic and business plans, and covered within Categories 1 and 3 of the recently updated *Conservation Authorities Act*. There are five roles and responsibilities within the Natural Heritage Program:

Natural Heritage Systems

NVCA is looking to develop a watershed wide natural heritage system to protect interconnected natural heritage features and functions at a watershed level.

Natural Heritage Systems are made up of natural heritage features and areas that are linked by natural corridors. These systems can include lands that have been restored, and areas that have the potential to be restored.

This work supports NVCA's watershed management objectives and plan review responsibilities.

Wetland regulations mapping and field verification

Conservation authorities across Ontario were prescribed by the *Conservation Authorities Act* to regulate wetlands. NVCA developed wetland mapping to support this updated legislation.

Watershed Science staff are responsible for keeping this map up to date, and they do this by using satellite imagery, as well as verifying wetland boundaries by site visits and using GPS units.

Conservation Land Inventories

Staff completes ecological surveys on NVCA properties, such as Tiffin Conservation Area, Nottawasaga Bluffs Conservation Area, Minesing Wetlands and most recently Boyne Valley Springs (Oliver Property).

Natural Heritage Monitoring

NVCA has been involved in invasive species management in various areas across the watershed. NVCA has partnered with Georgian Bay Forever, the Town of Collingwood, Blue Mountain Watershed Trust and various condominiums to manage Phragmites along Collingwood shoreline.

Some other monitoring efforts include species at risk and forest and marsh bird monitoring.

Program Communications and Outreach

NVCA publishes Watershed Health Checks every five years to provide results of data analysis member municipalities, partner organizations and interested members of the public.

Employee Handbook Update

The Board of Directors approved two changes to NVCA's employee handbook: updates to the Remote Work Policy, and the addition of the Right to Disconnect policy.

Remote Work Policy

Depending on the eligibility of the position, and upon approval, staff may establish a remote work agreement with NVCA. This policy was created by a committee formed of Human Resources Managers at six different conservation authorities, is being implemented at many of the CAs in the Province. It ensures that all legal and liability issues are addressed



while allowing staff who are eligible to enjoy some flexibility.

Right to Disconnect Policy

Due to work-related pressures, the current landscape of work, or an employee's work environment or location, employees may feel obligated or choose to continue to perform their job duties outside their normal working hours.

With this new policy, staff are encouraged to set clear boundaries between work and their personal lives.

Inventory of Programs and Services for Submission to MECP

The Conservation Authorities Act required conservation authorities to prepare Transition Plans outlining steps and timelines for the preparation of an Inventory of Program and Services and for the development and execution of funding agreements with participating municipalities.

Staff created this inventory and completed a 5-year average of financials for each along with the appropriate category they will go under (1, 2, or 3 as per the CA Act). This inventory will be part of the discussions with our municipal partners and for the creation of MOU's relating to category 2 and 3 items requiring municipal levy.

Dear Premier Ford

At the Town of Gravenhurst Council meeting of Tuesday February 15, 2022, Council passed the following motion:

WHEREAS Municipalities across this province collectively spend millions of dollars of taxpayer money and municipal resources developing Official Plans that meet current Provincial Planning Policy;

AND WHEREAS an Official Plan is developed through months of public consultation to ensure, "that future planning and development will meet the specific needs of (our) community";

AND WHEREAS our Official Plan includes provisions that encourage developments to meet the need for attainable housing in our community;

AND WHEREAS our Official Plan includes provisions that encourage developments to meet certain environmental standards which are voided by the Provincial Policy Statement;

AND WHEREAS our Official Plan is ultimately approved by the District of Muskoka, as delegated from the Province, in accordance with the Planning Act;

AND WHEREAS it is within the legislative purview of Municipal Council to adopt Official Plan amendments or approve Zoning By-law changes that better the community or fit within the vision of the Town of Gravenhurst Official Plan;



AND WHEREAS it is also within the legislative purview of Municipal Council to deny Official Plan amendments or Zoning By-law changes that do not better the community or do not fit within the vision of the Town of Gravenhurst Official Plan;

AND WHEREAS municipal planning decisions may be appealed to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT; formerly the Ontario Municipal Board or "OMB"), an unelected, appointed body that is not accountable to the residents of the Town of Gravenhurst;

AND WHEREAS the OLT has the authority to make a final decision on planning matters based on a "best planning outcome" and not whether the proposed development is in conformity with municipal Official Plans and consistent with Provincial Planning Policy;

AND WHEREAS all decisions—save planning decisions—made by Municipal Councils are only subject to appeal by judicial review and such appeals are limited to questions of law and or process;

AND WHEREAS Ontario is the only province in Canada that empowers a separate adjudicative tribunal to review and overrule local decisions applying provincially approved plans;

AND WHEREAS municipalities across this Province are repeatedly forced to spend millions of dollars defending Official Plans that have already been approved by the province or their designate in expensive, time consuming and ultimately futile OLT hearings;

AND WHEREAS lengthy, costly OLT hearings act as a barrier to the development of attainable housing;

AND WHEREAS the existence of the OLT acts as a barrier that restricts municipalities from protecting the environment from development that is uncharacteristic of its community;



NOW THEREFOR BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- The Town of Gravenhurst requests the Government of Ontario dissolve the OLT immediately thereby eliminating one of the most significant sources of red tape delaying the development of more attainable housing, and restricting a municipality's ability to enforce self-determined environmentally-friendly development policies in Ontario;
- A copy of this Motion be sent to the Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Leader of the Opposition, the Leaders of the Liberal and Green Party, all MPPs in the Province of Ontario; the Large Urban Mayors' Caucus of Ontario, the Small Urban GTHA Mayors and Regional Chairs of Ontario; and,
- 3. A copy of this Motion be sent to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) and all Ontario municipalities for their consideration.
- 4. A suitable alternative appeal process be investigated by the Province utilizing an elected board of appeal

As per your request, we are writing to you about S.H.I.F.T.'s urgent need for programming space. I have cc'd Jenna Dollin, S.H.I.F.T. Project Manager and lead for the Planning & Development Committee on this as well, by way of connecting you.

S.H.I.F.T. offers safe, respectful, and welcoming overnight accommodations, meals and supports to those experiencing or at-risk of experiencing homelessness and/or food insecurity in the 5 municipalities that make up South Simcoe. As a housing-focused organization, we are committed to facilitating connection to further services, resources, and community.

There is a growing need in our community for our services. We are the only homeless shelter and outreach services provider in South Simcoe. As an organization we want to ensure that people have access to adequate services within their home community of South Simcoe, instead of feeling forced to find services in other communities and become separated from their resources and supports.

As we discussed, S.H.I.F.T. is desperately in need of a new home.

Since opening in 2017, a local church has generously offered the use of their building at an affordable cost. Recently, the church has undergone space and capacity changes and they are looking to reclaim their building as soon as reasonably possible. At the same time, as we have expanded our programs to better meet the needs of our community, we have quickly outgrown the space, and require a larger building.

S.H.I.F.T.'s Planning and Development Committee has been hard at work looking for a new location that will adequately and effectively house all of S.H.I.F.T.'s needs. We have been actively pursuing both purchase and rental opportunities; however, we are finding that with the current real estate market and limitations of zoning, finding suitable affordable space has been a challenge. We are reaching out to you now, for your assistance and direction in supporting us to find a new location for our services.



- at least 2500 sq. ft.
- situated in Alliston (established as the most appropriate location for headquarters of our services), near the downtown area
- storage and administrative (office) space
- a designated (separate) space for the shelter program from other regular programming space
 - o ideally enough room to shelter at least ten individuals
- fully accessible both external and internal accessible access
- full kitchen
- multiple single person washrooms with at least one shower for the congregate setting

Our organization is in the process of launching a capital campaign that will help offset costs of owning/operating a new location; however, support from our community leadership would help ensure we find a location that best meets the needs of those we serve.

We thank you for advocating for our organization and understanding the value of our services in the community.

We have provided a brief summary of our services below. For more information, please head to our website (www.shiftforgood.ca).

We currently operate four programs in South Simcoe:

Our **Emergency Overnight Shelter** program offers overnight shelter to individuals and couples, 16+, experiencing homelessness, with no housing alternatives. As a short-term, housing-focused shelter, the program is intended to bridge the gap between entering homelessness and moving into safe and sustainable housing.

- Our Community Dinner program runs daily during the regular operating season (winter) and is
 open to anyone in the community looking for a warm meal and friendship. Staff are onsite to
 provide resources and supports.
- Our Outreach Program provides street and mobile services that have a specific focus on the
 prevention of homelessness serving those living with low-income throughout South Simcoe
 and the surrounding area. The goal of the Outreach Program is to connect individuals, couples,
 and families to urgently needed supplies, services, and supports as well as provide emergency
 assistance to those at-risk of or experiencing homelessness and/or food insecurity (housed or
 otherwise).
- Our Daytime Drop-In Centre program is open to anyone experiencing homelessness, as a safe, warm place to access basic needs, harm reduction supplies, food, shower, internet, and housingrelated supports during the daytime. Staff are onsite to assist participants with housing-related activities, community resources, and supports.

2021 Census Data Release - Growth and Population

Recommendation

That Item CCW 2022-077, dated February 22, 2022, regarding the 2021 Census Data Release – Growth and Population, be received.

Executive Summary

Statistics Canada releases Census Data every five (5) years. This data includes detailed statistical portraits of Canada and its people by their demographic, social and economic characteristics. The 2021 Census Data regarding growth and population was released on February 9, 2022. Some of the key indicators of this data include the 2021 population, population change between the 2016 and 2021 Census data, population density per square kilometre, and total number of private dwellings. Please refer to Schedule 1 to Item CCW-2022-077 for the 2021 Census Data specific to the County of Simcoe and our lower-tier municipalities.

Staff is providing this Council Report Item CCW 2022-077 as information. A subsequent Council Report will be forthcoming, which will analyze the Census Data and explore some of the growth indicators in more detail.

Background/Analysis/Options

The initial release of 2021 Census Data provides growth and population information. This data can be broken down into key indicators for various geographic areas in Canada, including the County of Simcoe and our lower-tier municipalities. Please refer to Schedule 1 of Item CCW 2022-077 for specific details.



The following information are highlights related to the latest data. Further analysis of the data will be provided to County Council in an upcoming Council Report.

The overall population growth rate for the County of Simcoe (excluding Orillia and Barrie) between 2016 and 2021 was 14.6%. In contrast, the growth rate between the 2011 and 2016 Census period was 7.5%.

New Tecumseth (28.3%), Bradford West Gwillimbury (21.4%) and Wasaga Beach (20.3%) were among the suburban communities who achieved the 25 highest growth rates in Canada between the 2016 and 2021 Census Data. Although not within the top 25 highest growth rates in suburban communities, Innisfil's growth rate was within the mix at 18.5%.

The previous 2011-2016 Census Data comparison on growth rate identified New Tecumseth (13.3%), Bradford West Gwillimbury (25.8%), and Wasaga Beach (17.9%).

The municipality of East Gwillimbury (44.4%), located south-east of Bradford West Gwillimbury was the fastest-growing municipality in Canada.

In addition, as a popular vacation and leisure location, the Blue Mountains (33.7%) is on the list of the 10 fastest growing municipalities. This could also be due to the optimal location for young retirees or those able to work from home to choose the Blue Mountains as their primary home through the pandemic.

The slowest growth rate among the County of Simcoe lower-tier municipalities was Adjala-Tosorontio (0.1%); with Clearview (4.7%) and Midland (5.7%) following behind.

The increase in 'total private dwellings' followed a very similar trend to the growth rates noted above with New Tecumseth (3,058) and Bradford West Gwillimbury (1,989) being among the top 3 local municipalities with the highest increase in private dwellings. Innisfil (2,653) and Collingwood (1,599) are important to highlight.

Subsequent release dates of the major topics include:

- April 27, 2022 shifting demographic profiles;
- July 13, 2022 portrait of families and households, including income profiles;
- August 17, 2022 linguistic diversity and use of English and French;
- September 21, 2022 First Nations people, Metis and Inuit, and housing portrait;
- October 26, 2022 citizenship, immigration, mobility, migration, ethnocultural and religious composition;
- November 30, 2022 education, changing dynamics of labour force, how people get to work, and instruction in the official minority language.



Barrie Warming Centre

The County of Simcoe was approached by the City of Barrie prior to the February 8th Committee of the Whole meeting with a request to match funding in the amount of \$20,000 via the Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative. This funding will go to the John Howard Society of Simcoe Muskoka for warming centre operations in order to support those experiencing homelessness in the Barrie and area.


On February 22, 2022, Council approved this funding and extended a request for County staff to meet with municipalities and stakeholders to review warming centre operations going forward.

Request for support from AMO regarding Joint and Several Liability

County Council has asked that the County of Simcoe call on the Attorney General of Ontario to work with municipal governments to put forward a plan of action to address 'joint and several liability' before the end of the current term of government to ensure municipalities can continue to offer high-quality services to their communities. With insurance costs to municipalities and upper tier governments rising exponentially, County Councillors agreed to support AMO's recommendations to align municipal



liability with the proportionate responsibility for incidents and capping awards.



County of Simcoe Bursary Program

In January 2022, the Bursary Committee met to discuss the status of the County of Simcoe Bursary Program for 2022. In light of the amount of bursary applications received, it was decided that only bursary applicants from participating municipalities within Simcoe County would be considered when awarding bursaries, with the exception of employees of the County of Simcoe and children/dependants of employees, who will maintain eligibility regardless of their municipality's participation.

County Council further explored the decision by the Bursary Committee, and after receiving more information with the rationale for the decision, approved the recommendations.



Acknowledgements

Councillors recognized Warden George Cornell's re-election as Chair of the Western Ontario Warden's Caucus for 2022 and offered their congratulations.

Councillors also recognized Steve McNeil's marathon (over 19-hour) skate for Alzheimer's research, raising over \$6,000 for the Alzheimer Society of Simcoe County.

County Council further applauded Collingwood Blues assistant trainer Lindsey O'Neill, and Aurora Tigers trainer and coach, Jen Vaicunas and Greg Johnston, for successfully using an AED machine at the Eddie Bush Memorial Arena in Collingwood, saving the life of a local resident who reportedly had a heart attack on the ice.

Re: Municipal Accommodation Tax and Crown Campgrounds

On January 1st, 2022, the Town of South Bruce Peninsula implemented a Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT). The tax equates to a 4% fee Levied on short term accommodations including, hotels, motels, rooming houses, bed & breakfast, cottage rentals and campgrounds, for all bookings of 30 days or less.

The Town of South Bruce Peninsula is the first jurisdiction in Ontario to levy the MAT on campgrounds. There are approximately 14 campgrounds within the Town of South Bruce Peninsula. Of those, one is a municipally owned campground, and one is a provincially owned campground, known as the Sauble Falls Provincial Park.

The Town recently amended the MAT program to confirm that our Town owned campground will contribute to MAT in the same manner as all of our privately owned campgrounds.

The Municipal Act states that "the Crown, any agency of the Crown in right of Ontario or any authority......" Is exempt from MAT. As such, the Sable Falls Provincial Park is not participating in the MAT program.

Several campground owners within the Town recently attended a Council meeting and stated their concerns and objections pertaining to the MAT exemption for the Sauble Falls Provincial Park. Town Council and private campground owners believe that this exemption creates an unfair competitive advantage for the provincially operated campground.

Council fully supports the position of our local campground owners and has passed the following resolution

"And further that the Town sends a letter to the Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks as well as to MPP Bill Walker requesting the removal of the Municipal Accommodation Tax exemption for all Crown owned campgrounds and that this letter is sent to all Ontario municipalities to seek their support"



By way of this letter, we are asking the province to remove exemptions listed within section 400.1 (1) of the Municipal Act pertaining to Crown owned facilities, specifically campgrounds.

Dear Mayor MacDonald and Councillors,

The Affordable Housing Task Force of the Simcoe County Alliance to End Homelessness — South Simcoe Chapter is working diligently with community partners, including municipalities and the County of Simcoe to address the immediate, intermediate, and long-term affordable housing needs of our community. Our goal is to develop at least one new mixed-income housing development with a minimum of 30% affordable housing units in each municipality in South Simcoe to help address the pressing need that the affordable housing crisis in South Simcoe has caused. To that end, we are trying to identify land that is owned by your municipality that may be appropriate for development as affordable housing.

We would greatly appreciate if you could please direct your Planning Departments to work with us to identify properties that may fit this need. We are asking that your planning department identify three properties that could potentially be prioritized for development in this way, taking into consideration access to public transportation, access to public utilities, and ease of access to basic needs such as grocery stores, pharmacies, etc. To assist in this process, we have a document that can be populated with relevant information.

We would appreciate a response by March 31, 2022, with information about available properties. Once this information is provided, we will use it to identify the best suited property for development, and work with the Municipality, County, funding partners and project leaders to begin the process of developing the property as agreed by all parties.

Thank you in advance for your assistance with this effort. By working together, we can ensure that the housing needs of our most vulnerable residents are considered and that we do our parts to address the affordable housing crisis in our community.




